**APPLY** 

#### WHAT ARE WE LEARNING?

- Analysing four artist models Sara Hughes, Keith Haring, Yayoi Kusama and Andy Warhol.
- Understanding and replicating the process involved with the technique of patterns.
- · Linking the theme of dairy with artistic process and iconic visual language.

#### TRY THIS WITH

- Year 1-3
- Students who have an interest in pattern making.
- Students who love making an artwork.

#### **FIND**

Discuss the word pattern.

Find

Practice describing the word in  $\underline{\text{different}}$  ways.

Are patterns things that are only in certain places or are there patterns around us everyday?

Challenge students to find patterns in their classroom, on their clothes, in their school?

Use digital cameras to photograph these.

Discuss the images in groups or as a class - see if students can answer the question 'What makes a pattern?' with examples from their photos.

Without any introduction, investigate the Pinterest Board.

Discuss the students' reactions to the artworks

Support them to describe their reaction.

Name each artist - <u>Sara Hughes</u>, <u>Keith Haring</u>, <u>Yayoi Kusama</u> and <u>Andy Warhol</u>.

See if they can identify the item each artist repeats in their pattern making.

Introduce the word <u>'Icon'</u> – a famous symbol that relates to a special idea or person (introduce the moustache printable and see if students can identify who owns each moustache).

Ask the class how people might make patterns.

Use everyday items to create patterns – pencils, erasers, <u>stickers</u>, <u>fingerprints</u>, lids etc.

Emphasis should be on <u>repetition</u> - the same thing many times, the same way, not on random pattern making.

Explain that our <u>class icon</u> will be the <u>moustache</u> and that we will make milk moustaches.

Students should decide what their individual pattern will be.

Each individual student should then make their pattern over their chosen icon moustache.

Keep the emphasis on repetition - the same thing many times, the same way not on random pattern making.

Students are able to then cut out their milk moustache.

Place a <u>bendy straw</u> through the moustaches so that students can hold them in front of their face.

Record the milk moustache class in all their pattern making glory with a photo.













### SUCCESS CRITERIA

Students can check they have successfully completed the challenge by:

- Articulating a response to each model artist's work.
- Creating a pattern that repeats the same thing, the same way, many times.
- Creating a milk moustache that incorporates their pattern.
